Our Arrangement for Next Year

Last week we sent out letters to parents informing them which class their children will be taught in, in September. The children were all very excited to find out who would be teaching them next year.

Preparing children properly for a new school year starts months ahead and is always very important. We take a great deal of trouble to get it right. Looking ahead and preparing well every year ensures our children come back in September excited about what is ahead of them, rather than being frightened by the unknown.

As part of our planned induction we organise an exciting 'moving up day'. On our moving up day the children are registered by their current class teacher and then move to their 'new class'. During the day we spend some time on agreeing a set of positive class rules based around 'consideration'. We also give the children an opportunity to complete some writing about themselves and complete a short maths activity. When the children come back in September we make sure they are greeted by the work they complete which is displayed in their new classroom.

At Birchwood we also spend a great deal of time ensuring that key transition information about each class and pupil is shared with next year's Teacher and Teaching Assistant. We ensure that the wealth of knowledge and information built up over the course of this year and previous years is passed on. This ensures that we can maximise learning potential and opportunities from day one, catering for all individual needs.

As well as our pupils, our school staff are also looking forward to next year. At the end of every school year there are always mixed emotions. Teachers and Teaching Assistants get very attached to their class and pupils. They spend a great deal of time and energy planning, preparing and delivering exciting learning opportunities. Over the course of the year they share a lot of experiences together and get to know each other very closely. Staff are often sad at the thought of not teaching or seeing their old class on a daily basis, but at the same time excited at the prospect of working with and getting to know another set of fantastic Birchwood pupils.

In September we will be losing a fantastic cohort of children as they take their next step in their learning journey to The Polesworth School, but hopefully they will all come back to see us and keep us updated on how they are getting on. At the same time we will be welcoming a brand new cohort of children who will be starting off their learning journey in Reception with Mrs Willis and her Early Years team.

September sees a lot of change, but one thing that will not change is our commitment to ensuring that Birchwood remains at its brilliant best and ensures that all our pupils receive 'Rich Opportunities and Memorable Experiences'.

Some children however can find the upcoming change a little daunting. In school we organise a range of extra visits, and activities in addition to moving up day to help with this for many children in school. However, if your child does mention worries about transition then it is helpful to talk with them at home about the things that they might have questions about. Sometimes the smallest things can be the source of the biggest worry, for example not knowing where to put their coat. In reality of course their peg will be labelled when they arrive, but pointing this out will probably help calm their fears. Reminding them of all the things that will still be the same will also be helpful, for example, the friends they will still be with or the playground they will still be going to. Perhaps the most important thing to reinforce with all children is that while change can sometimes be unsettling for a little while, it is also exciting and that new and interesting challenges are ahead. <u>Myths and Legends</u> 'It doesn't matter if my child is late for school' Not what the children would say! They absolutely hate being late. They arrive after all their friends are already sat down in school and enter a classroom of 30 others looking at them. At the start of the day teachers take registers, explain to the children what they will be doing for the day and all sorts of other important instructions about what will be happening around school. Apart from this being late is NOT an authorised absence. Persistent lateness will often result in contact from Education Social Workers who inspect our registers and will prosecute for persistent cases.			

Improve your wellbeing by developing your resilience

Being self-aware and knowing strategies to help ourselves is vital for both adults and children if they are to become effective practitioners in successfully managing their own well-being. It is for this reason, that we not only share these with the children in lessons but also with the wider school community through our newsletters and on-line links. We hope you found last week's article on <u>confidence</u> useful and are ready for our third instalment which will focus on <u>connection</u>.

<u>Connection</u>: Developing close ties with family, friends and the community to help develop a sense of security. This helps prevent children seeking alternative destructive paths when reaching out for love and attention.

Help children connect with others by:

- © Building a sense of emotional safety. Being mindful of the words we choose and our tone of voice is critical when communicating with others. Sarcasm and jokes can often cause emotional harm rather than disperse worries. Phrases such as 'man up' can often make people feel inadequate and do not offer practical suggestions on how to manage a situation.
- Building a sense of both physical safety. When someone believes they are at risk of harm, such as lack of food, shelter or protection from physical danger, then their brain will not be able to access their higher order thinking skills in order to assess a situation logically or identify solutions. For this reason, sharing concerns over these matters with children without any answers as to solutions may negatively affect their well-being. Giving children precise information when they ask about the set up at a new club or venue can often alleviate worries. If you do have worries of your own about any of these issues, please do not hesitate to contact us at school. We are able to sign post people to support services and can offer a range of support through the school.
- Allowing children to express their emotions to different people in different circumstances. This helps the child feel more comfortable in reaching out during difficult times. It also provides opportunities to address conflict openly and resolve problems.
- Fostering healthy relationships helps to reinforce positive messages and values. Children will look to both other children and adults as examples of how to behave and manage a variety of situations. Integrity is quickly lost if a child is given advice by someone who does not follow that advice themselves. Spending time together, communicating and taking part in shared activities helps children build up trust.

Next week we will be looking at two elements of resilience; **Character and Contribution**, and how important developing and being aware of our own set of morals and using these to guide our actions, can benefit both us and others.
