Communication and information sharing

Birchwood is a very busy and vibrant school with lots of interesting and exciting things going on. Ensuring we keep everyone informed and up to date with 'All Things Birchwood' is a constant challenge, which is made even more difficult under the current restrictions.

To help support our school to stay in touch with our families and community we have devised many methods of communicating and use these in different ways depending upon what information we are trying to share and whom we are sharing it with.

Face to face communication with parents is still very important to us but probably the most difficult for us to achieve at the moment. Although time is very limited before and after school, our staff are trying to make themselves as available as possible for parents to share brief messages. As I am sure you can appreciate, this is difficult to do whilst maintaining social distance and keeping our one way system flowing. We also encourage regular communication between home and school

via 'Me to You', school letters, school text messages, reading diaries and medical forms.

Throughout the year we timetable regular opportunities to report to parents regarding progress children are making in school. We send out interim report slips in the Autumn and Spring terms and follow these up with Parents Evening appointments. This week we have had to hold our parents evening remotely by telephone. Although these have been well received by parents, we have missed having the opportunity to invite you all into school and to share with you first hand your children's learning and achievements so far this year.

At the end of the school year we send out a full report detailing children's attainment and progress and celebrating their achievements. This is normally followed up with an invite to parents to come into school for our 'Show and Share' event, to celebrate all our children's learning. We are very much hoping that we will be able to have our parents and families back into school by then.

Our school newsletter 'The Birchwood Bugle' continues to be the main way we keep families and our community up to date with school life. We think that it is very important for this to go home in the form of a paper copy still, so that parents can refer back to it and keep sections for future reference. A colour digital copy is also available each week on our school website. Myths and Legends ...

'The school won't let me take my child on holiday in term time!' Wrong! In actual fact the law will not let you, and the school has no option but to follow the law or it can also get in trouble. The Department for Education say:

'The current law **does not** give any entitlement to parents to take their child on holiday during term time. Any application for leave must be in exceptional circumstances and the

Headteacher must be satisfied that the circumstances warrant the granting of leave'.

Parents can be fined for taking their child on holiday during term time without consent from the school; indeed <u>parents at</u> <u>our school have already received large fines for doing so.</u>

- It is important that children attend school regularly if they are to benefit from the learning opportunities provided.
- Children who are absent from school due to a holiday in term time will miss out on important learning.
- The time teachers have to help all the children in a class is reduced if they spend time helping a child to catch up after a holiday.
- Educational experiences in school missed as a result of a family holiday cannot be re-captured later.
- If your child does not attend school regularly, he/she will not be able to keep up with the work. This will have a serious impact on opportunities later in life.

We find it very embarrassing being put in the position of refusing holiday absences when these are requested, especially when we regularly remind parents that holidays should **<u>NOT</u>** be taken during the term time.

Bearing in mind our one school rule of 'Consideration and Respect ' please may we remind parents/carers to park courteously on the roads surrounding school.

It is important to ensure that driveways and pavements are not obstructed as this can prove dangerous for other road users, pedestrians and can be frustrating for our neighbours. Thank you for your support and co-operation.

Using Technology to Support Learning.

Technology plays an important part in all our lives, even more so now than ever before. At Birchwood, we weave technology into the curriculum to support and add to children's learning experiences, to build their knowledge and add to their skills across a whole range of subjects.

This week in school for example, Year 3 have been using Kahoot on the iPads to help them work with a partner to solve maths questions together. The buzz and enthusiasm from the children in the room and the amount of maths discussion it was creating was fantastic to see.

Technology can also support learning at home, and children across years 3 to 6 have been keen to tell me all about the books they have been reading on 'Reading Plus' this week. Having a huge digital library of books and questions to support their understanding of what they are reading at their fingertips both in school and at home is not only generating excitement about reading, but also helping boost their reading skills.

Although technology can play a big part in supporting learning, children will also need encouragement and engagement with adults to help guide them. Your support with reading at home, practising spellings and 10 for 10's and home learning continues to be vital.

As part of our commitment to offer our pupils rich opportunities and memorable experiences, we would like to continue to make links between their learning and our community as much as we can. This personal approach helps make learning relevant and therefore more engaging for pupils. As part of this term's science day activities, we would like to build up the



children's science capital by asking parents, friends and family to send into school a 60 second video recording or brief written outline of what their job or hobby is and the role science plays. For example: a fire fighter could use their knowledge of properties of materials to explain why different types of fire extinguishers are used in different places or why certain materials are used as part of their uniform; a chef may explain how knowing that baking powder reacts to create a gas and this makes cakes rise (chemical reactions and irreversible changes); nurses and carers could give examples about

k hygiene, vaccines or specialist equipment; someone who enjoys fishing may share their knowledge of habitats and life R cycles.
