Celebrating and Rewarding Positive Behaviour

To ensure that our school is as safe as it can be for all children, parents and staff to attend, there are many safety measures that we have had to put in place. Unfortunately, the guidance that we have to follow also restricts us delivering some of the excellent practice we have established over the last few years.

We invest a great deal of time trying to support and encourage our children to take on extra responsibilities and roles in school. These include House Captains, School Council, Eco Council, Digital Leaders, Road Safety Team, Tuck Trolley Monitors, Play Leaders and Librarians. As Year Group Families are not permitted to mix, we are currently unable to support these roles and groups in school.

It is also frustrating that we are not always able to teach the way we would prefer or to share the same 'rich opportunities and memorable experiences'. We know how our children learn best, but it is difficult to support this when children are having to sit in rows, all facing the same way and where staff have to be mindful of their social distance and contact with children. We are also desperately missing our wonderful trips out of school, our after school activities and being able to welcome in all of our visitors into school. We are, however, really pleased that we are still able to hold celebration assemblies and our BASE skills academy, even if they have had to be slightly adapted under the current conditions.

At Birchwood we are very keen to celebrate children who are considerate and respectful all of the time. To reward them for always trying their very best, children earn the right to take part in 'Skills Academy' to support our BASE (Birchwood Additional School Experience) programme. If children have followed our one school rule and shown consideration and respect all week and have tried their best in all their learning, they will be entitled to thirty minutes of BASE skills academy time on a Friday afternoon. During BASE Skills time, pupils will have the opportunity to take part in a wide range of enjoyable skills based activities of their choice, run by our fabulous teachers and teaching assistants. Children get to choose from a range of different skills activities including Lego, football, music, art, dance, cooking and many more. They will spend the half term practicing and refining these skills during their BASE time. Each half term there will be a new set of skills activities for the children to choose.

Birchwood Best Practice

History

History is a subject which lends itself perfectly to the way that we teach at Birchwood. It helps give us a backdrop



to plan many cross-curricular lessons, whilst also teaching the children about the periods, people and events that have shaped the world around us.

At Birchwood, history is taught first as a set of skills. Our children learn to identify differences between then and now, to be able to put events in chronological order, and to express their own thoughts and ideas about the past.

In key stage 2, the children begin to learn about the different periods in British history: from the Stone age in year 3, to World War Two in year 6. These are taught in chronological order, and the children love to identify links between these time periods and discuss the changes that have occurred over time.

We also look in detail at World history. Children at Birchwood have the opportunity to explore ancient civilizations such as the Mayans, Egyptians and Greeks and develop their understanding of how these cultures rose and fell, and how their impact can still be seen on the world today. Myths and Legends....

'It doesn't matter if my child is late for school'

Not what the children would say! They absolutely hate being late. They arrive after all their friends are already sat down in school and enter a classroom of 30 others looking at them.

We now have a 10 minute window for children to arrive:

Reception & Year 1 – 8.30am-8.40am

Year 2 & Year 3 - 8.40am -8.50am

Year 4, Year 5 & Year 6 – 8.50am- 9.00am

At the start of the day teachers take registers, explain to the children what they will be doing for the day and all sorts of other important instructions about what will be happening around school.

Healthy Lunchboxes

Top Tips.....

• Keep children fuller for longer - Base the lunchbox on foods like bread, rice, pasta and potatoes. Choose wholegrain where you can.

- Always add veg Cherry tomatoes, or sticks of carrot, cucumber, celery and peppers all count towards their 5 A DAY.
- Swap the sweets Swap cakes, chocolate, cereal bars and biscuits for malt loaf, fruited teacakes, fruit breads or fruit (fresh, dried or tinned in juice not syrup).
- Get them involved Get your kids involved in preparing and choosing what goes into their lunchbox. They are more likely to eat it if they helped make it.

Our one school rule 'Consideration and Respect' has always been focused on the importance of everyone playing their part in keeping our school both a happy and safe place. Our staff model these values to our children, then our children to each other. They do this both in school and beyond our school gates and its importance cannot be underestimated.

In these unprecedented times, these values of personal responsibility for helping to make our school and

wider community a pleasant and safer place are more important than ever. In school we have reinforced, with all children, the key hygiene messages of regular handwashing, 'catch it, bin it, kill it' and through the idea of our personal bubbles and year group families and also in social distancing.

Our parents and other adults have a really important role to play in supporting these messages both at home and in the community, but also when dropping off and collecting children. It is so easy to forget and slip back into 'normal' routines.

This week Warwickshire County Council have encouraged, via their social media platforms, parents to wear face coverings, if you are able to, when dropping off and collecting your children from school. They have also highlighted the importance of maintaining the 2m social distance from other parents and children during this time.

There are vulnerable children and parents within our school community, and we all need to work together to remember to protect all of our 'bubbles' to do all we can to stay safe. Thank you for your continued support.
