School Attendance

At Birchwood we want the very best for all our children. We know that children only get one chance at a decent education, which is why it is so important for children to attend school regularly. We are extremely proud of the excellent attendance record our children at Birchwood have. Our children love coming to school to learn and I often hear of children who hate missing even one day through illness. Many of our children come to school even if they are not feeling 100%. As a result we have made a really good start to this academic year and our average attendance across school is over 97%. There are also currently 291 in school with 100% attendance!! This is fantastic, thank you for your continued support with getting children to school on time.

It sounds obvious but children are more likely to succeed when they attend school consistently. It is not just about the lessons that are missed when children are absent, children also find it very difficult to engage in lessons when they return back to school. Often they will have missed key and important teaching points that would have allowed them to access the next stage of learning.

Good attendance at school is vital for children to achieve their full educational potential. Children with good attendance records benefit in the following ways:-

- Continuity of learning which makes progress and retention easier
- Enhanced performance in lessons and examinations
- Continuity of relationships and friendships with adults and peers
- Good habits that are formed for later life

Our focus is however very much on reward. We encourage children to be on time and attend by giving children lots of praise when they are 'being brave for carrying on' with minor ailments like a cold. So far this year we have 377 who have never been late for school. We reward 'never lates' and 'good attendance' by giving children certificates on a termly basis, which the children are very proud of. We do however understand that children are sometimes unwell and certainly do not wish children to come into school ill just to achieve an attendance reward, and for this reason we also include children whose attendance is also very slightly below 100%. We also give out Attendance of the Week trophies to the 2 classes with the highest percentage.

I am also very grateful to the wonderful staff at Birchwood, whose attendance rates are excellent. It is very rare for our staff to have a day off school unless they are on a training event or visiting another school.

Our staff are well aware of the importance of consistency and they all want the very best for all of our children. They all work extremely hard and are very tired by the end of the week. Even when they are not feeling 100% themselves, they still manage to smile when in school. Thank you all for your continued support.

Speak up, someone can help

Tell your child that if they ever feel sad, anxious or frightened they should talk to an adult they trust.

This does not have to be a family member. It can also be a teacher or a friend's parent - or even ChildLine. Remind them that whatever the problem, it is not their fault and they will never get into trouble for speaking up.

Reminder for Parents

Leave of Absence during Term Time

As you will be aware, current attendance regulations stipulate a Head teacher may not grant a leave of absence during termtime unless there are exceptional circumstances.

Each application for a leave of absence will be considered on a case by case basis and on its own merits.

It is for the Head Teacher to decide what he/she views as 'exceptional' and it is at their discretion, if the circumstances warrant the leave to be granted. If the leave is granted, the Head teacher is able to determine the number of school days a child can be absent for.

The school can only consider Leave of Absence requests which are made by the 'resident' parent.

Where applications for leave of absence are made in advance and refused, the child will be required to be in school on the dates set out in the application. If the child is absent during that period, it will be recorded as an unauthorised absence, which may result in legal action being taken against the parent(s), by way of a Fixed Penalty Notice.

Failure to make an application for Leave of Absence can also result in a Fixed Penalty Notice being issued to the parent(s). Where a Fixed Penalty Notice is issued and not paid within the required timeframe as set out on the notice, the matter will be referred to Warwickshire County Council's Legal Services to consider instigating criminal proceedings under S444 Education Act 1996.

Parents are asked to respect the new regulations under which the school must work and if there is a need to take a child out of school during term-time, an application or request must be made in advance and make clear how the circumstances are exceptional.

Nasal Flu Immunisations

On **Tuesday 10th December**, the NHS team will be in school to administer Nasal Flu Immunisations.

Nasal Flu consent and information packs have been sent home this week. Please complete and return the form to the school office via your child's 'From Me to You' by Friday 22nd November, even if you do not wish your child to be vaccinated. Thank you.
