# Just be kinder to each other!

At the time of writing this, the awful news regarding Caroline Flack, is still very fresh and raw. This clearly vulnerable lady was subjected to months of negative media coverage, abuse and online trolling, much through the use of social media.

Whilst advances in online technology have brought many significant advantages, social media seems to have encouraged a concerning trend where people feel they have a right to make comments about other people. Unfortunately, far too many of these are often negative. It seems it is far too easy to make comments about other people when you are not face to face with them.

At Birchwood I am very proud of the fact that we have 440 children and 50 adults, who for the vast majority of the time, are just kind to each other. There are occasions when children may say or do something to someone else that they do not like. At these times we encourage our children to say 'Stop It Please'. When this does not work, adults in school are available to offer further support.

We also have just one school rule which is 'Consideration and Respect'. Our whole school ethos and culture is built around this and is one of the main reasons why our children enjoy coming to school to learn and why our teachers choose to teach here. Birchwood feels like an extended family. Daily I see lots of examples of where staff and children support each other, are nice, helpful and caring. Occasionally, as with all families, there are disagreements and fallings out, but these are usually sorted quickly.

As well as 'Consideration and Respect' being our rule at school, I also ask our children to follow this when outside of school, particularly when they are online. Being online is an integral part of children and young people's lives. Social media, online games, websites and apps can be accessed through mobile phones, computers, laptops and tablets – all of which form a part of children and young people's online world.

The internet and online technology provides new opportunities for children to learn and grow, but it can also expose them to new types of risks. Cyberbullying incidents often occur at home, but the problems can spill over to the classroom, which is why we actively look to support and to teach our children about how to stay safe. Most of the time following our one school rule supports positive relationships in the online world too.

In a time where there is a definitely a need for people to just be kinder to each other, they could do a lot worse than follow the excellent example set by our Birchwood children and staff!

# **Heights and Weights**

In line with government guidelines, all children in reception and year 6 in Warwickshire are offered a height and weight measurement (National Child Measurement Programme). It is recommended that the outcome of your child's weight is not shared with your child as it is for parent's information only. If you have any concerns about your child's health or you would like to opt your child out of the height and weight measurements you can contact The School Health and Wellbeing Service on 03300 245 204. health is linked to educational attainment, therefore the healthier children are, the more likely they are to attend school regularly, focus and participate in lessons, and achieve their potential.

# **Holidays during Term Time**

### Ensuring children do not miss out

In September 2013 there were significant changes to the law with regards to holidays being taken during term time. In effect Headteachers were no longer permitted to grant an 'authorised holiday' in term time unless under 'exceptional circumstances' and following completion of a 'Leave of Absence Application form'.

'Exceptional circumstances' are considered to be only those which are 'rare and serious issues' and not because of parents 'work commitments' or the availability of 'cheap holidays'.

Our parents are incredibly supportive and it is now very rare indeed for any of them to request holidays during the school term. Parents understand the impact of children being away from school even for a short time and the impact on their child missing carefully planned programmes of work.

We occasionally hear 'my child will catch up'. Unfortunately, this is wrong. We do not have the opportunity to reteach planned lessons and our clear evidence is that missing school causes problems which ripple through a child's education career. Our policy, which matches the law exactly, is repeated regularly in our newsletters. The school does NOT approve of any holidays being taken during the term time. The simple reason for this is that we wish the best for the children and understand with complete certainty that missing school impacts significantly on progress.


There is a common myth that 'I will not be caught'. The large fines levied at those deciding to ignore the rules would suggest otherwise! Unfortunately, a child returning tanned, talking about the wonderful time they have had, as well as the ability of the schools 'attendance software' to recognise unusual attendance patterns, often results in an unwelcome letter from the Local Authority 'Enforcement Service' and a 'fixed penalty notice'. Last year the local authority introduced an initiative which allows them to take 'retrospective action' when it comes to light that absences have been for holidays. This has unfortunately resulted in action against a very small minority who have been less than honest about school absence.

The local authority state: 'there are 180 days a year when children are NOT at school'. Holidays for children should be taken during the school holidays.
