Reading at home and in school.

At Birchwood we are always looking to improve our practice and are constantly looking for ways to give children more choice and independence in their learning in school and at home.

Reading is at the heart of our school curriculum. We recognise the importance of immersing our children in high quality varied texts that simultaneously promote the power and enjoyment of reading for our children, whilst also teaching and nurturing specific skills for reading. We know that being a successful reader is one of the key indicators to future success in life.

We have invested heavily in school on new whole class texts that drive our curriculum themes, group texts to support effective guided reading sessions and individual reading books to support our children's love of reading. We also have a very well-resourced library that our children are able to spend time in during the school day. We really hope that we will very soon be able to allow our children to borrow library books again for use at home and also invite our parents back into our library to help their children choose suitable books to read together.

In Key Stage 2 we have recently introduced 'Reading Plus', a web-based program that builds upon the foundational skills of phonics to develop silent reading fluency and comprehension (deeper understanding), while re-engaging reluctant readers in reading for pleasure.

Children in Years 3 to 6 have been given login details so that they are able to choose from a variety of age appropriate texts (fiction, non-fiction and informational) on a variety of topics, from animals to fashion! These texts are exciting and fun to read, but they are also closely matched to children's specific reading level. After selecting and reading a high quality text, children can then practice applying their knowledge and understanding by answering 10 comprehension questions, targeting some of the key skills for reading, such as inference and use of language. After reading and answering questions based on a text, Reading Plus automatically adapts the selection of texts which are available based on the children's ability, providing individualised support and facilitating progress.

Children are motivated and encouraged to read frequently on Reading Plus, as the more they read, the more 'avatars' they are able to collect, allowing them to personalise their Reading Plus profile. Children are also motivated to read more accurately, as the more accurately they read, the more 'combos' (pairs of activities scoring 80% or above) they are able to collect, helping them to progress onto the

next level. Once children progress to a new level, their achievements are rewarded with a certificate – these will be presented to children in our weekly celebration assemblies within school.

In school, we will continue to work diligently to promote reading, however we recognise and value the support of our parents in creating a positive reading culture at home; it is vital that children are encouraged to read frequently, and we therefore ask that children spend a minimum of two 30 minutes sessions on Reading Plus at home. These sessions will, of course, count towards your child's weekly reading target.

Teachers will be celebrating Reading Plus successes within school, whilst also using the data to carefully plan future lessons and intervention, something which will allow us to support the progress of your child.

We will be introducing some of our more fluent Year 2 readers to Reading Plus in the summer term. Our younger children will also be able to use this fantastic resource as they move further through our school.

Spotlight this week is on... Winter Clothing



As November has arrived, it would appear, so has the colder winter weather. Very suddenly the temperatures have dropped and we are all finding it far chillier, despite some lovely winter sunshine. Children often need reminding that even if the sun is shining in the winter months, they will still need to wear a warm coat. At breaktimes and lunchtimes we will be encouraging children to wear coats when the weather is cold and it is important that they come to school suitably dressed for the colder weather.

Inevitably, many children in the class will have similar or indeed identical, coats, hats, scarves and gloves. Please, please, please can you ensure that your child, no matter what age they are, has their name in all their belongings. Naming belongings makes it so much more likely that we can return an item to you if it gets mislaid.

It is also really helpful if you have a routine with your child for where they put their gloves, scarf and hat when they take them off. For example, gloves always going in a coat pocket, or putting the hat and scarf down your coat sleeve. This way children will always know where to look for their own things rather than them ending up on the floor which makes it less likely they will get lost.

Birchwood Best Practice

Drama

Before joining Birchwood, I spent many years training in Performing Arts and teaching dance and drama.



Drama is important in developing children's confidence and creativity as well as encouraging empathy and building social skills. Team work, leadership and acceptance of other people's ideas are all crucial personal qualities that can be developed through drama.

Through incorporating drama into subjects such as English, children can explore characters and perspectives from the text they are reading or the piece of writing they are working towards in more depth. This allows them to clarify their own ideas in a practical way before they write anything down. Verbalising their ideas and putting them into sentences aloud often significantly increases the quality of the writing children produce.

The Start of the School Day

An ordered and prompt start to the school day is surprisingly important for primary aged pupils. The start of our school day is a very calm and orderly affair, but a great deal goes on and every single minute is optimised. Children enter school, hang their coats and bags up and place lunch boxes into trolleys.

Children will often have a warm up activity on the whiteboard, or at their desk, which they start without further instruction from their teachers. These activities range from a mental maths puzzle, or a short piece of writing, or some reading and responding to feedback. Sometimes these activities consist of children improving a piece of work from the previous day or even answering a direct question from the teacher's marking. Whilst the children do this, we take an attendance register and find out their lunch choice for the day.

Before 9.00am office staff will have followed up most unexplained absences, hence the great importance of parents informing the school of any absence by 8.30am using the answer phone. In the classroom the teacher will have explained the work for the day, discussed groups and allocated children to teaching assistants.

Children's lateness is extremely rare, but when it occurs it makes life difficult for the school and for the child. Apart from the difficulty caused by needing to open up registers, re-explain the tasks for the day (all of which stops staff from working with other children), the 'late child' also starts the day feeling 'left out' and 'out of sorts'. Being late for school means children are disadvantaged for the remainder of the day.

Our school day starts times are as follows:


